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Something You Are Sure to Notice

I f there is one thing I enjoy, it's getting out in the Garden to help greet our guests. I may help someone with directions for those not familiar with the Garden but I also get a chance to hear from them what they think of their experience. Now I have to admit that one of the reasons I find this so enjoyable is that I hear lots of compliments.

It is very common for first time visitors to tell me that they are pleased beyond what they expected. In fact there are still many local North County residents who are just discovering the Garden. These folks admit feeling a bit guilty they waited so long before visiting and likewise will often say: ".... wow I had no idea visiting the Garden would be so enjoyable". Then there are those who have been regular visitors and most likely are members who often are the most enthusiastic about telling me what they think of what the Garden offers.

The fact is, the visitor experience has improved remarkably over the years and people have noticed it. The saying is "necessity is the mother of invention" and it has been a great motivator for the San Diego Botanic Garden.

It was back in October of 1993 that the Garden became self-supporting. The Garden which had been operated and staffed by the County of San Diego suddenly was left to make sure it could earn the revenue it needed to not only stay open but offer more to the visitor experience.

From that time on our goal was to improve the visitor experience under the guidance of our mission to "inspire people of all ages to connect with plants and nature". So, the goal has and continues to offer a quality experience in everything we do. Well, it has worked and anyone can see that we have not only kept the Garden from closing but have secured its future.

In fact, given the success of the Hamilton Children's Garden, which could be considered the jewel in the Garden's crown, we are excited about a second phase for the HCG. You will be hearing more about that in the course of this year.

With so many changes, there has been one element in the growth of the Garden I have to admit has lagged behind some of our other accomplishments. And that is our gift shop and plant sales



area. It may seem strange that an opportunity for earned income would have been a later improvement for the Garden but our gift shop had some large hurdles to overcome.

One of the biggest challenges for our gift shop and one we still have until the Garden can expand, is its location. Not everyone visiting the Garden has to pass by our gift shop and any public garden, museum or zoo gift store can only maximize its potential if located where visitors are sure to have seen it.

So investing a great deal in modifying our woefully too small gift shop has never been a practical venture. It took the good minds of staff, volunteers, our project manager, Rudy Stuber of JRS Construction and DPA Atelier, our designers, to come up with a plan to expand the gift shop and give the whole area a fresh look to insure a return on our investment.

Well it is a reality now and while I have to admit that personally I am more apt to get excited about a new addition to the Garden displays, I really love what has happened to our gift shop. We have been able to preserve the iconic original heavy post supported A-Frame structure and add a solarium-like addition which has more than doubled the interior space. We have also completely upgraded the plant sales area with a very attractive new fence and new and uniform plant display benches all of which makes the entire area more inviting.

We had only recently come up with the concept for upgrading the gift shop and plant sales area when it caught the attention of one of our board members, Carol Dickinson. Carol has a keen appreciation for the financial welfare of the Garden and has long believed that if we approved the gift shop it would become a better income source for us. There was another reason Carol wanted to make the upgraded gift shop possible with her donation: she knew the history and how it is entirely a volunteer produced endeavor. Not to mention there was one person, in particular, whose decades of dedication as our volunteer gift shop manager tugged at Carol's heart strings. That person is Joyce Sapp. Joyce has been tenacious and tireless in her efforts to make the gift shop as successful as possible and we cannot thank her enough for all she has done.

It is only recently that Joyce found someone to take the reins of managing the gift shop and that person is docent and volunteer, Roberta Dotson. I can tell you that Joyce is celebrating the wonderfully improved gift shop but also for the great job Roberta is doing in managing the gift shop.

We are so fortunate to attract such talented people to the ranks of our volunteer ranks. Roberta has extensive experience as an interior designer and has been our principle source for the completely new look on the interior of the gift shop. I also have to mention Dave Merritt who is wonderfully handy at carpentry and has played an important role in implementing the improvements.

Another volunteer who has been very involved with the gift shop project is Heather Spadone. Through contacts she and her husband Paul Spadone of Streamline Development, have provided, we were able to have a beautiful recycled teak floor donated for the project by Indo Teak Design. Heather took over as buyer for the gift shop for Elspeth Yin who was a very talented volunteer buyer for many years.

Clearly, the gift shop is an important asset to the visitor experience and I think you will now be more likely to find something – plant or other unique item - you will want to buy and by doing so add to your support of the San Diego Botanic Garden.
